Accreditation

Adjunct Faculty

Description:

Provides students with the general academic background to be successful in their chosen healthcare field. For students pursuing admission to the Nursing program, please follow these steps:

- 1. Complete the program admission requirements including NAT exam
- 2. Apply to the Nursing program
- 3. Complete the remaining Nursing program admission requirements
- 4. The requirements for an Associate Degree does **not** have to be completed to be eligible for admission/entry to the Nursing program.

Specifications:

- 1. Enrollment Fall Class
- 2. Orientation
 - a. Certain procedures must be followed and academic requirements fulfilled, prior to admission to the nursing program.
 - b. Applicants must first be admitted to the college of nursing & allied health and designate nursing as their curriculum.
 - c. Applicants must have a high school GPA of 2.7 or better. A college GPA of 2.7 or higher must be established if the candidate has been out of high school for over ten years.
 - d. The program has a limited enrollment and admits the bulk of its students in the fall semester, with a smaller group admitted in the winter semester.
 - e. Admission to Nursing Degree granting programs is on a first-qualified first-served basis.
- 3. The three stages for admission to the nursing program for generic students and licensed practical nurses seeking the A.D.N. are
 - a. Obtain copies of the specific Admission Requirements for Nursing from the Admissions Office or the Nursing Office.
 - b. Complete the requirements to get onto the Waitlist for the program.
 - c. No prerequisite, non-nursing support or nursing course can be repeated more than one time to receive a "C" (no C-) or better grade.
 - **d.** High school grades are only valid within 10 years of attendance.

COLLEGIATE NURSING EDUCATION PROGRAM WAITLIST

St. Augustine's Institutes - Collegiate Nursing Education Program Waitlist is running about 1 year wait.

- High school GPA of "A" or "B" (3.0) throughout a one year laboratory course, or BIO 131-Introduction to Biology, or its transfer equivalent or better, with a minimum grade of GPA-2.7 or better maintained.
- High School cumulative GPA of 2.7 or better, or Minimum G.E.D. test score of 550 or higher, or Completion of 12 credit hours at a Consortia Institution at 2.7 or higher, or Transfer credit of 2.7 or higher or an additional 12 credit hours at Consortia Institution to establish required G.P.A. "C" (no C-).

Chemistry

High school GPA of "A" or "B" (3.0) throughout a one year laboratory course, or CHEM 131-Principles of Chemistry, or its equivalent or better, with a minimum grade of "C" (no C-).

Math

High school GPA of "A" or "B" (3.0) throughout a one-year math course, or MATH 074-Pre-Algebra, or its transfer equivalent, with a minimum grade of "C" (no C-).

Placement Tests

Placement tests, required developmental coursework, and all admission requirements must be completed before students are considered for admission to the Nursing program.

Nurse Entrance Test (NET)

The required Nurse Entrance Test (NET) is offered by the nursing division. A second failure of the test requires taking courses in areas of weakness.

Free assistance is available through the Learning Lab. A third failure of the NET test prevents entry into the nursing program.

NET tests must be taken at the St. Augustine's Institutes Learning Center. The NET requirements are:

- 1. Math Proficiency on the NET test A minimum of 65 is required.
- 2. Reading Proficiency on the NET test A minimum of 65 is required.
- 3. NET composite must be a minimum of 65%.
- 4. The NET test must be retaken every two years, for those who have not entered the program or for those who readmit to the program. Any new criteria established by the nursing division must be met.

Basic Life Support for Healthcare Professionals (CPR)

All students are required to complete and maintain a course in Basic Cardiac Life Support for Healthcare Professionals.

It is strongly suggested that CPR be taken between May and July, just prior to entering the nursing program. It must be kept current throughout the program.

Certified Nurse Assistant for Pre-Nursing Professional (CNA)

All students seeking admission to Nursing Program are required to complete the CNA Course or equivalent prior to admission.

These courses are required for placement on the Waitlist.

Nutrition HSC 100;

Micro; A&P 1 and 2 with Lab;

Professional Development * International Leadership Institute;

Patho with Lab and Medical Math,

Completion of ENG 131, ENG 132 and PSY 131, with a minimum grade of "C" (no C-), is required.

Successful completion of a drug screening and criminal background check is required.

OVERVIEW

Students may enroll in up to three courses per semester, but should not enroll in more than two lab courses at the same time.

Anatomy is to be taken prior to Physiology and may not be taken in the same semester.

TUITION

While USA - UC advocates "Free College Tuition and Student Assistance" accessing Education Grants based on availability in the state registered and the student/s eligibility.

USA - UC Students may qualify for Financial Aid accessing Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (Title IV, HEA program).

Affiliated Legacy Institutions exempt from participation require payment as follows.

- **\$2400** per 4 credit course
- \$60 additional fee for Microbiology, paid directly to vendors after course begins.

Transfer Options/Requirements

The Collegiate Nursing Education Program has articulation agreements and/or transfer guides to help students who want to transfer to other institutions once they have completed their studies within St. Augustine's Institutes @ University College. APPENDIX "A"

General Education Requirements:

The following courses are required in this program and satisfy the St. Augustine's Institutes @ University College General Education Outcomes for this program. Students who change their program will need to confirm in advance that they are completing all required courses for their specific program of study, including additional General Education courses.
